Course goals

This course seeks to introduce students to the analysis of phonological dialect variation as represented in literary discourse. It takes a historical approach and focuses on the evidence preserved in nineteenth-century dialect writing in order to examine the main phonological features of English regional speech at a time of marked dialect levelling and awareness. The course thus aims to help students understand and interpret the representation of provincial sounds in light of relevant historical (socio)linguistic theories and methodologies, while showing the potential of dialect writing to uncover aspects of dialect phonology, both linguistic and ideological. It is, therefore, **mandatory** that students who take this elective course have previous background on English phonetics and phonology, whereas knowledge of the history of the English language and dialect variation is **highly recommended**.

On completion of the course, it is expected that students will achieve the following competences:

Teaching and learning methods

The course consists of theoretical and practical sessions. On the one hand, the theoretical contents of the course will be presented in the form of lectures that aim to provide students with the necessary background to deal with the analysis of dialect phonology represented in literary texts. On the other, the practical sessions will draw on the course's theoretical component to focus on major methodologies whereby students will acquire a range of skills relating to the linguistic analysis of dialect sounds. These sessions will revolve around selected case studies that will enable students to explore the representation of dialect phonology with key resources such as corpora, dictionaries and corpus analysis software.

Needless to say, the course will be taught in English, which means that students are expected to have an advanced level of this language (at least C1, CEFR).

Assessment

The assessment of this course is based on the following criteria:

- Participation and engagement in class discussions and activities: 25%
- Written assignment: 75% (further information will be detailed in the course planning)

Recommendations

Students are advised to attend classes regularly and make an appointment during the teachers' office hours to ask questions and solve doubts they may have about the contents of the course.
